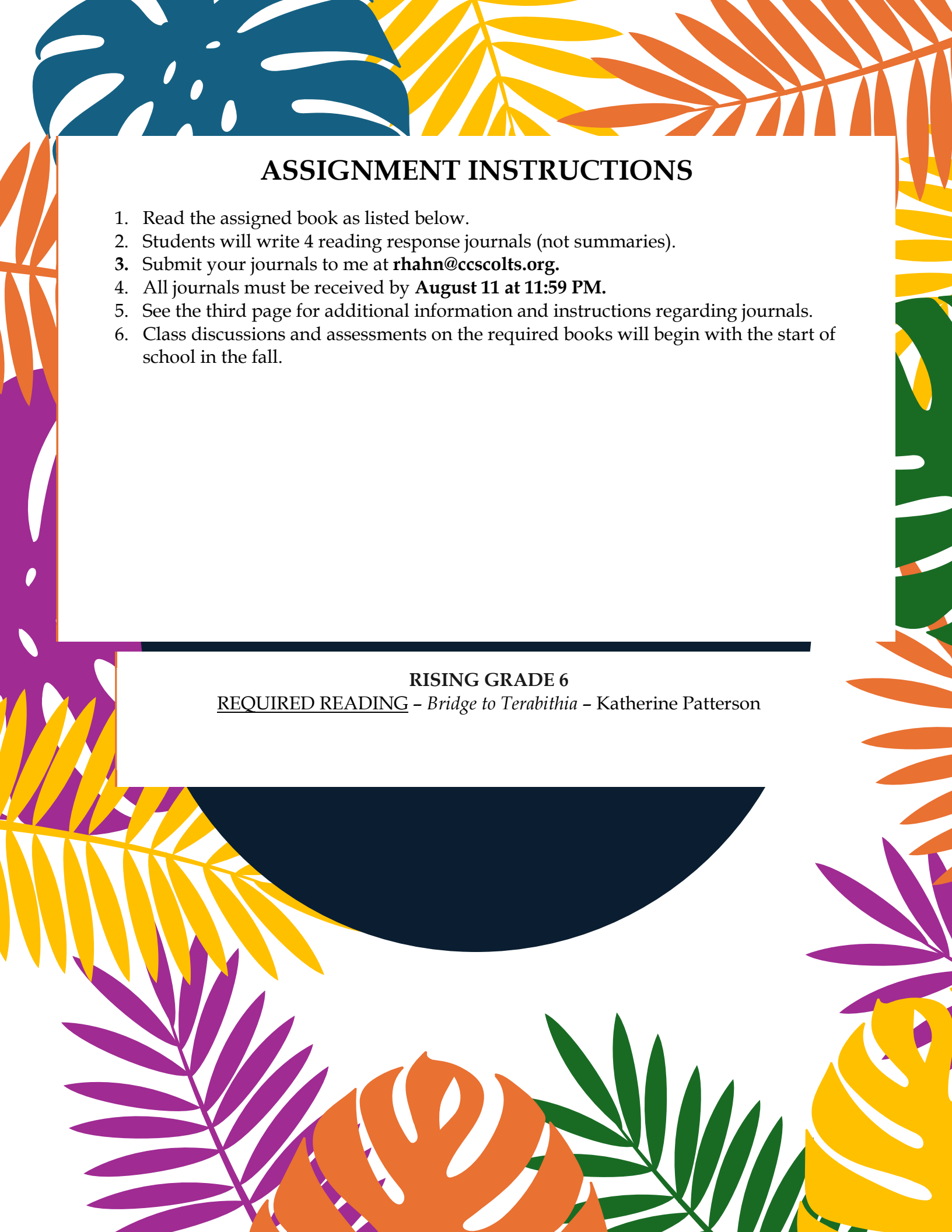

Why does Crossroads Christian School have required summer reading?

- *Students can lose up to 25 percent of their reading level over the summer.*
- *Students can lose up to three months of their education over the summer.*
- *This loss is cumulative – so by the time a student enters high school or middle school, he or she could be years behind grade-level standards.*
- *This can be prevented – by reading! Reading just four books over the summer can prevent the summer slide and can actually increase a student's reading level.*

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READING RESPONSE JOURNALS

INSTRUCTIONS

Four journals will be written: one after you finish the first fourth of the book, one after you finish one half of the book, one after you finish three-fourths of the book, and one after you complete the book. NOTE: If your book does not have chapters, please break up the number of pages into four sections. I recommend marking each section with post it flags in the beginning, as this will remind you to STOP AND WRITE. Each journal should be at least 1 paragraph in length (minimum of 6 solid sentences). You can't be wrong in your responses, as these reflect your personal reactions to the text. Take some risks and be honest.

Use the sample prompts below to help you get started with expressing your likes/dislikes, confusion, and observations. **These prompts are suggestions, not requirements.** Tell me what you think something means. Make predictions about what might happen later. Use your personal experiences to connect with the plot, characters, setting, etc.

Sample Prompts:

- I really don't understand the part where . . .
- I really like/dislike this idea because . . .
- This character reminds me of somebody I know because . . .
- This character reminds me of myself because . . .
- I think this setting is important because . . .
- This scene reminds me of a similar scene in (title of book/movie/T.V. show) because . . .
- I like/dislike this writing because . . .
- This part is very realistic/unrealistic because . . .
- I think the relationship between _____ and _____ is interesting because . . .
- This section makes me think about . . .
- If I were (name of character) at this point, I would . . .
- I began to think of...
- I noticed...
- I'm not sure . . .
- I wish that...
- I was surprised . . .
